- Loggan's Mill and area development
- Angarrack ropewalk
- Angarrack tin smelter
- · Copperhouse dock and area
- The old Cinema
- Market garden houses
- Path extension from St George's Lane, originally railway line
- Bridge on black road, seek heritage listing
- Draw up a map and lists of original locations of mills
- Preserve local names of areas where enhancement has taken place
- Professional design of Hayle Heritage branding.

- Brewery Office and Brewery Yard
- Passmore Edwards Building
- War Memorial
- Drill Hall
- Original shop front for Carwin's Dairy
- Merchant Curnow's Quay
- Swing Bridge
- Ex Gasworks office buildings.

Following the listing of the above points it was felt that some of the projects could benefit with help from volunteer helpers and groups to clear sites.

Georgina Schofield stated that she was in possession of copies of the Copperhouse pool
