INTRODUCTION

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Delivery Framework is to enable the region to actively manage the delivery of the South West Regional Economic Strategy (RES).

Vision

The RES sets out the following vision:

‘South West England will have an economy where the aspirations and skills of our people combine with the quality of our physical and cultural environment to provide a high quality of life and sustainable prosperity for everyone.’

Statement of Intent

The vision is underpinned by a clear statement of intent:

‘South West England will demonstrate that economic growth can be secured within environmental limits to bring prosperity to the region.’

Strategic Objectives

The vision will be delivered by three strategic objectives:

- successful and competitive businesses
- strong and inclusive communities
- an effective and confident region

THE DELIVERY FRAMEWORK

- summarises confirmed activity to deliver the RES
- highlights proposals for additional activity
- sets out how progress to deliver activities will be measured
- identifies lead organisations who are either directly responsible for the delivery of activity, or for reporting on the progress of a range of partners to deliver an activity

Scope of the Framework

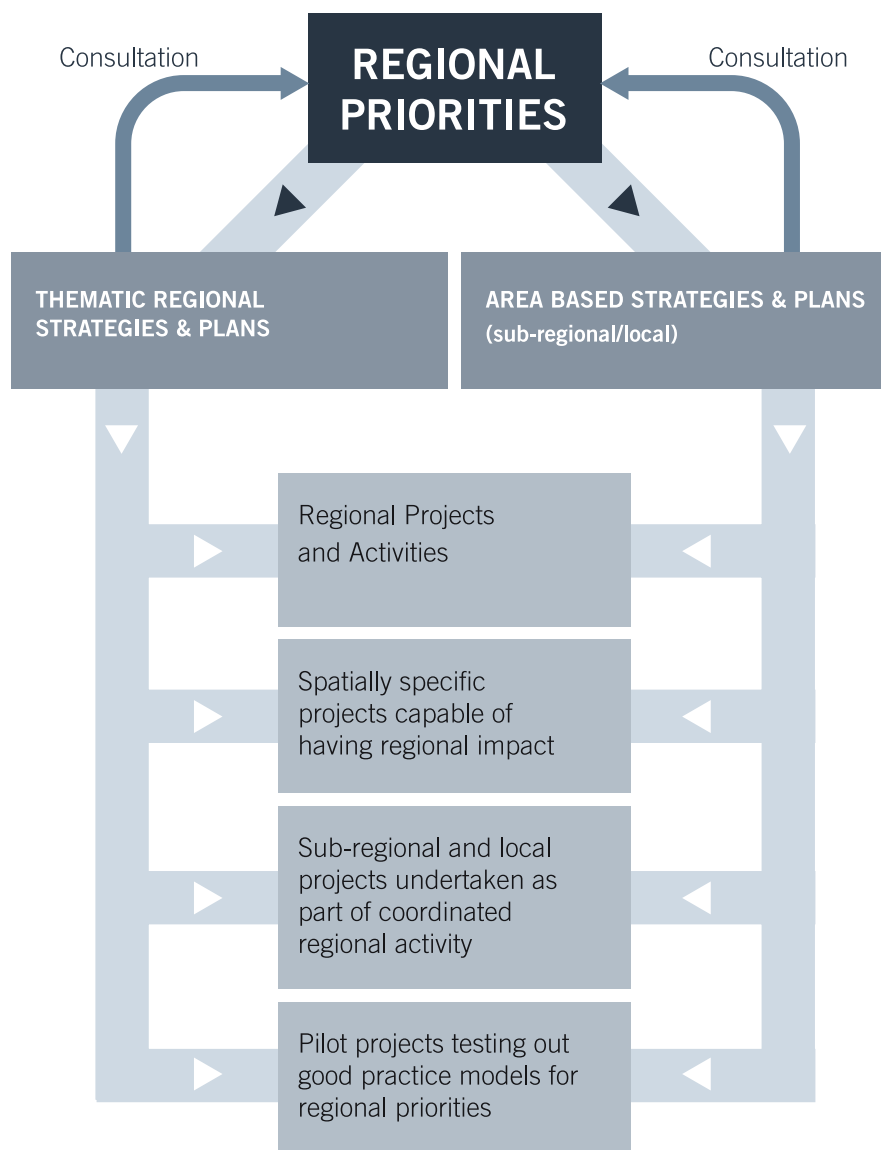


Figure 1: RES delivery

The RES is a regional document, bridging the gap between national policy and sub-regional delivery of economic development activity. It reflects regionally agreed policies for economic development in the South West and, as such, identifies priorities for activity which will have the greatest impact on achieving the three objectives across the region as a whole. The Framework includes many activities which are most appropriately delivered through sub-regional and local mechanisms, complementing and strengthening area specific priorities (illustrated in Figure 1, p 4).

The Framework generally identifies activities at a headline level only. The detail on how these activities will be delivered is articulated through specific regional strategies and plans (e.g. the South West Skills Strategy or the Regional International Trade Strategy), and through delivery organisations’ business planning processes. Links to relevant documents are made through the framework.

The Framework sets out confirmed and proposed activity for the period 2006 – 2009. It will be updated during this time (see p 4 ‘Moving Forward: Monitoring Progress’) and then fully revised as part of the 2009 review of the strategy.

Structure

The Framework provides a programme of activity under each of the 11 regional priorities identified in the strategy.

For each priority, the plan includes the following information:

Introduction

A summary of the current regional position and context for delivery in that priority; information on headline success measures and relevant strategies; and detail on partners who will contribute to delivery.

Confirmed activity

Activities underway or planned with identifiable delivery partners and measures of progress.

Proposed activity

In some areas, the review process identified activities that are important to the successful implementation of the RES, but where delivery mechanisms and resources are still to be identified. The South West RDA will work with appropriate partners to consider the best way to bring these activities forward.

Cross cutting themes

At the end of each priority, the Framework uses examples to outline how the three economic drivers identified in the RES can shape activity, and how the priority can contribute to sustainable development (including diversity and equalities) and to the successful delivery of the Integrated Regional Strategy, ‘Just Connect’.

To avoid unnecessary duplication, links between activities under different priorities are identified in the text by the following symbol: ➤

MOVING FORWARD: MONITORING PROGRESS

The Framework provides the basis for assessing progress in implementing the RES. The South West RDA will review progress against identified measures on an annual basis, publishing reports in April 2007 and April 2008.

The Agency will work with partners to ensure that the Framework remains a dynamic and relevant document which reflects progress to date and responds to new circumstances and challenges. New activities will be added where there is a clearly identified need, whilst existing activities may be removed where they have been achieved or are no longer appropriate. Measures of progress will also be developed and updated to ensure these are as robust as possible. Updates to the Framework will be published on the South West RDA website.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE FRAMEWORK

The Framework has been developed alongside the review of the overall strategy. This has been a four stage process which started in May 2005 and will be completed with the publication of the Strategy, Delivery Framework and supporting documents. The main stages of the process were:

- preparing and agreeing the evidence base
- consulting on key issues
- preparing and consulting on the draft Strategy and Delivery Framework
- developing and publishing the final Strategy and Delivery Framework

REGIONAL PRIORITY 1A: SUPPORT BUSINESS PRODUCTIVITY

Current position

In 2004, the region's productivity rate (GVA) was £15,611 per capita, ranking 4th of the English regions. Research on the region's productivity 'gap' highlighted a number of important factors that influence the productivity of businesses in the region, with factors such as skills, investment, innovation, and international trade playing a key role in determining competitiveness.

Although a wide range of services exist to assist enterprises to address these issues, national and regional research has highlighted a number of gaps and weaknesses in current provision, which has steered the development of activity under this priority.

Regional context for delivery

The Business Link network, responsibility for which now lies with the South West RDA, will be the primary entry point for publicly supported business advice. In future, the role of the network will focus on an information, diagnostics and brokerage (IDB) service, signposting the region's enterprises to the most appropriate source of support to address their needs.

In addition to the generic service provided by the Business Link network, there are a number of specific areas where other organisations will deliver targeted activity to address identified market failures. These include improving access to certain types of business finance, increasing provision of advice on resource efficiency, supporting high growth businesses,

encouraging regional sourcing, and making sure there is an appropriate supply of employment land for the region's businesses. Some of this activity will be targeted at key regional industries – including manufacturing, food and farming, and the identified key sectors. Given the geography of the region, an additional focus for activity is to ensure that rural enterprises are able to access a full range of support services.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- increased business productivity
- increased business resource efficiency
- improved performance of business support organisations

REGIONAL PRIORITY 1A: CROSS CUTTING THEMES

The Strategy highlights a number of important cross cutting themes that should shape the development and delivery of all activity under this priority. This section aims to assist this process by highlighting **examples** of how activity will be steered by:

- sustainable development objectives (taken from ‘Securing the Future’, the UK National Strategy)
- diversity and equalities
- the three economic drivers identified in the RES – Skills, Innovation and the Environment
- objectives set out in ‘Just Connect’, the Integrated Regional Strategy

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- business resource efficiency activity under this priority will help contribute to more sustainable patterns of production by the region’s enterprises

Climate Change and Energy

- ensuring businesses are aware of both the challenges and opportunities of climate change in the region will ensure that the region is best placed to respond to these, and to contribute to wider national objectives around climate change

Protecting Natural Resources and Enhancing our Environment

- implementation of the Strategy for Sustainable Farming and Food will increase environmental stewardship schemes in the region and help support the sustainability of rural businesses

Sustainable Communities

- the promotion of community finance initiatives will support the development of social enterprises that can play an important role in addressing areas of market failure in local communities

Diversity and Equality

Whilst there is a clear moral obligation for economic development activity to support diversity and equality of opportunity, there is also a strong business case for doing so. Research has shown that the introduction of flexible/family friendly working arrangements can make an important contribution to competitiveness. Measures such as job-sharing, increased opportunity for part-time or term-time working, help with childcare, and arrangements for working from home have been shown to contribute to increases in productivity and quality performance, and to reduce labour turnover. The RES identifies a number of specific activities, including the promotion of effective employee relations, and flexible working arrangements, to support this.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- one of the critical determinants of business productivity is skills. The implementation of the new IDB service will help ensure that businesses are able to access appropriate training and information to enable them to develop more productive businesses

Innovation

- an important tool for innovation is ICT. The innovation driver can be applied by ensuring that all new sites and premises developed by the public sector have the highest levels of broadband width to enable tenant companies to exploit opportunities from increased use of ICT

Environment

- the environment increasingly drives business productivity, through new market opportunities, through the need to respond to higher costs associated with energy and waste, and through the impact of the environment in attracting and retaining new employees

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the Integrated Regional Strategy (IRS):

- *ensure natural resources are used much more sustainably, by using land wisely, minimising waste and increasing recycling, using renewables and promoting sustainable construction and good design.* This will be supported through activities on business resource efficiency and sustainable construction
- *ensure that the competitive position of the South West’s economy is improved and that differences in economic performance in the region are addressed.* All activities under this theme focus on ensuring businesses are able to access the support they need to improve their competitiveness

REGIONAL PRIORITY 1B: ENCOURAGE NEW ENTERPRISE

Current position

The RES evidence base concluded that the South West is an entrepreneurial region, but that this tended to be concentrated by area and by sector, and that an element of the region's entrepreneurial activity was in response to lack of alternative employment opportunities. It highlighted the need for interventions to focus on creating an appropriate climate for individuals to develop new enterprises, and to ensure that support focuses on the process of business creation and growth.

Regional context for delivery

Enterprise, in the form of new small businesses or offshoots of existing activity, enhances productivity by increasing competitive pressures and more efficiently meeting existing, changing or emerging needs in the economy. Since the last version of the RES was published, the Regional Strategy for Enterprise has set out a programme of work to promote enterprise in the South West. This included activity to develop a culture of enterprise; to support new and high growth businesses; and to improve the provision of services to social enterprises. In addition, a number of new national programmes – including the Local Enterprise Grant Initiative (LEGI) and Enterprise Zones – provide further opportunities to promote and encourage enterprise across the region.

Developing a culture of enterprise requires input from many partners in the region. Positive perceptions of enterprise need to be developed at all stages of the education system, with schools, careers services, FE and HE all having a role to play. Promoting the South West – both internally and externally – as an entrepreneurial region will also help reinforce positive perceptions. Support for new enterprises is provided by a range of public, private and voluntary sector organisations. The new Business Link IDB service will provide a single gateway to the most appropriate support.

The consultation process has also reinforced the need for additional activity to support social enterprises, and to encourage enterprise in disadvantaged areas and amongst groups that have traditionally suffered disadvantage.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- increased number of people considering going into business
- improved start-up and survival rates
- increased levels of enterprise in disadvantaged communities

Climate Change and Energy; Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- there will be opportunities for new enterprises to address challenges arising from climate change, energy, and environmental protection

Sustainable Communities

- activity to support new business development in groups that have traditionally been disadvantaged will help contribute to sustainable communities

Diversity and Equality

If the region is to achieve a significant increase in the number of people establishing new businesses, it needs to ensure that all sections of society are provided with appropriate support to do so. There is evidence to show that some groups – including BME and women entrepreneurs – can find it harder to access traditional sources of support and finance. The RES therefore identifies targeted activity to address this.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- the skills driver shapes the delivery of this priority through, for example, working with schools, colleges and universities to deliver enterprise training to young people

Innovation

- developing a culture of enterprise in the region that encourages more people to create new businesses is a challenging task. In reality, many initiatives that have tried to do this in the past have been of limited success. If we are to influence a significant shift to an enterprise culture, we will need to consider new, innovative approaches that will do this. Some of the programmes to support enterprise in disadvantaged groups are recognised as being innovative, and the delivery of activity under this theme should learn from their experience

Environment

- environmental technologies are predicted to be one of the fastest growing global industries over the next 20 years. The environment will therefore be a significant driver of opportunities for new enterprises in the region

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *ensure that the competitive position of the South West’s economy is improved and that differences in economic performance in the region are addressed.* The development of new enterprise is an important component of a successful economy. Activity under this theme also identifies the need for support in specific areas and communities to help address differences in economic performance

REGIONAL PRIORITY 1C: DELIVER SKILLS FOR THE ECONOMY

Current position

SW employment and unemployment rates are amongst the “best” in the country. The juxtaposition of relatively high employment and low productivity appears to confirm the picture painted by recent research – that the South West exhibits high labour utilisation in quantitative terms but is not utilising its skills to best effect. There are important shortages in intermediate skills but addressing inadequate basic skills and boosting the highest skills are the main priorities for policy intervention.

For further detail see the Evidence Base Annex (pp 21-23), and the Strategy document (pp 24-25).

Regional context for delivery

Activity to ‘deliver skills for the economy’ is primarily steered and delivered by the organisations that make up the South West Regional Skills Partnership (formally the SWESA). This provides the framework for post-16 skills and training activity in the region. It has a clear focus on matching demand and supply to support a more efficient and effective labour market, steered by the development of sector skills agreements.

Access to skills and training by businesses will be delivered through the new ‘Train to Gain’ brokerage network. This will signpost businesses to appropriate skills providers to meet their needs, and will complement the Business Link IDB service.

Activities and progress measures under this priority have been agreed by the Regional Skills Partnership Board and are included in the draft South West Skills Strategy.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- reduced number of adults in the workforce lacking NVQ2 or equivalent qualifications
- increased proportion of young people achieving NVQ level 3
- increased levels of participation in higher education

Diversity and Equality

One of the main characteristics of an efficient labour market is one where the available workforce is employed to its full potential. Therefore, if certain groups in society face barriers to realising this potential – through discrimination, lack of access, or unavailability of facilities such as childcare – the region’s economic performance suffers. The RES, therefore, identifies a range of activities – such as increasing enterprise and skills in groups that are under-represented in the economy, and childcare – to help address this issue.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- the importance of skills as an economic driver has led to the development of this regional priority as a focus for delivering the future skills needs for the economy

Innovation

- innovative approaches to the delivery of training can help tackle persistent skills gaps. The ‘Learning

Works for All’ programme provides new ways to support the development of skills for life in the workforce through trade unions. The programme, developed in the South West, has been recognised nationally as an example of good practice, and will continue to help support this priority

Environment

- the RES highlights the importance of sustainable construction to improve the quality and reduce the environmental ‘footprint’ of new development. Activity to help ensure that the construction industry has the appropriate skills to do so is key to reducing environmental impacts

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *Focus on the attainment of skills at all levels, and at all ages to improve the life chances of individuals and the long-term economic prosperity of the region.* Activity under this priority, along with that set out in 2A, will support the life chances of individuals through the attainment of skills that will help them to secure and maintain a job/income. It will also support long-term economic prosperity through action to improve the effectiveness of the labour market
- *Ensure that the competitive position of the South West’s economy is improved and that differences in economic performance in the region are addressed.* This will be addressed through the development of workforce skills throughout the region

REGIONAL PRIORITY 1D: COMPETE IN THE GLOBAL ECONOMY

Current position

The evidence base highlights low trade and direct investment rates as a continuing weakness of the South West economy. Despite some improvements since 1999, by 2004 the region still generated the lowest value of exports per employee in the UK, and had the lowest proportion of its GVA accounted for by exports. In terms of inward investment, the region constituted just 5.5% by value of the UK total (2002/3).

Given the clear evidence that both trade and investment are vital components of productivity – and that the region's ability to compete in the global economy will influence future prosperity – it is appropriate for this to be recognised as a regional priority.

Regional context for delivery

In 2004, UK Trade and Investment in the South West (UKTI) and the South West RDA published the second Regional International Trade Strategy (RITS).

The strategy sets out four main objectives, which are reflected through this delivery plan, and provides more detailed information on how international trade activity is being developed and delivered in the South West.

Work to support inward investment is coordinated at a regional level by the South West RDA, which is responsible for the marketing and promotion of the South West, and for managing initial enquiries

from potential overseas investors. Regional actions complement sub-regional activity by SRP's and local authorities to attract and retain investment.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- improved international trade performance of South West business
- retention and growth of domestic and international investment in the South West

- whilst competing in the global economy is important for the region’s future economic success, it does raise significant sustainability challenges – not least the impact on carbon emissions from increased international business travel and trade shipments. The region needs to acknowledge these challenges and consider how they can be addressed as part of the SW debates. Meanwhile, the region should pursue practical solutions such as improved broadband connectivity and logistics to minimise the environmental impact of increased international trade

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- activity to enhance the natural environment will help to maintain the attractiveness of the region to visitors and investors

Sustainable Communities

- investment in the region by business from other regions and countries is an important driver of productivity. However, the RES recognises the importance of ensuring that investment is appropriate for the area in which it will be located. This will help ensure maximum benefit for local people and businesses, and help to embed the investor in the region for the long-term

Diversity and Equality

The region’s diversity – in all senses of the word – is one of the region’s most significant strengths. Work to promote the region to new businesses or investors should use this to change perceptions of the region and encourage investment.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- improving access to language skills through the Regional Language Network will help to ensure that the region’s businesses have the skills required for successful international trade

Innovation

- businesses who wish to compete in the global market have to be innovative by definition, offering new or better products, services or processes that are not currently available in overseas markets

Environment

- the quality of the region’s environment is an important driver in attracting prospective investors to the South West

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *ensure that the competitive position of the South West’s economy is improved and that differences in economic performance in the region are addressed.* The region’s future competitiveness will be strongly influenced by how it responds to the opportunities and challenges of globalisation. Activity under this theme aims to help the region to increase levels of international trade and investment in a positive way that helps to meet wider regional objectives

REGIONAL PRIORITY 1E: PROMOTE INNOVATION

Current position

The RES evidence base showed that the region is performing well on some measures of innovation. It enjoys relatively high levels of R&D activity, and performs well in terms of high technology patent applications. It has some world-class strengths in its universities and research establishments. However, these positive figures must be seen alongside some on-going challenges. Business led R&D for example, is highly concentrated in a small number of companies, and overall regional figures for HEI research funding are comparatively low – in spite of some significant strengths in the region's universities. Performance on patent applications is very varied at a sub-regional level, as are patterns of ICT usage across the region.

Regional context for delivery

The South West Innovation Strategy (2001), provides the framework for regional activity to promote the use of Innovation, Technology and Science. This will be updated in 2006 to reflect the updated RES, the changing national and international context, and the development of the South West Science and Industry Council (SWSIC). The Council will provide an important focus for specific work to improve how science and technology is used to improve the region's competitiveness.

The role of HEIs and public sector research establishments in supporting the commercial

exploitation of knowledge is increasingly important to the delivery of this theme. Work to promote the use of ICT as a critical tool for business innovation will be driven through the implementation of the Regional ICT Strategy.

Whilst some of the activity under this priority specifically focuses on increasing the use of innovation, science and technology in business, the RES also recognises the need to encourage a culture of innovation across the public sector, in schools and colleges, and in voluntary and community organisations – if the South West wants to remain a successful, prosperous region in the future.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- improved levels of innovation and ICT take-up in South West businesses and organisations
- increased levels of collaboration between the region's knowledge base and businesses

REGIONAL PRIORITY 1E: CROSS CUTTING THEMES

The Strategy highlights a number of important cross cutting themes that should shape the development and delivery of all activity under this priority. This section aims to assist this process by highlighting **examples** of how activity will be steered by:

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- activity to develop demonstrators for innovative technologies will support South West businesses to develop new approaches to sustainable production, e.g. Wave Hub

Climate Change and Energy

- one of the main themes under the Innovation priority is the take-up and use of ICT by the region, including the continued development of the region’s broadband infrastructure. This offers significant potential in reducing the need to travel – and thus carbon emissions – through increased use of video-conferencing and home-working

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- increasing the contribution of the region’s science base is likely to realise new processes for environmental improvements. If these can be commercially developed, they also present considerable economic opportunities for the region

Sustainable Communities

- the need to develop a culture of innovation is not limited to business. There is considerable scope for both the public, and voluntary and community sectors to be more innovative in how they deliver their objectives. In looking to build sustainable communities of the future, new and innovative approaches will need to be developed, for example, to deliver public services to reflect changes to society

Diversity and Equality

Whilst the growth of the ‘knowledge economy’ presents significant opportunities for the region, there is a risk that this could lead to increased polarisation in society. For example, it is clear that skills for, and access to, ICT is increasingly essential to ensuring that individuals are able to fully participate in the economy. However, research shows that individuals from some disadvantaged groups can face barriers to acquiring such skills. Activity to support the roll out and use of ICT must therefore be designed to narrow any ‘digital divide’.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- there are a number of ‘tools’ that can assist the innovation process including ICT and design.

Activity to enhance business skills in these areas is highlighted in the RES

Innovation

- the importance of innovation as an economic driver has led the development of all activity under this priority

Environment

- the environment is a significant driver of new market opportunities in, for example, the renewable and waste sectors. South West business will need to innovate to develop the processes and products that will enable the region to benefit from these growing markets

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the Integrated Regional Strategy (IRS):

- *to increase investment in the region’s knowledge base and develop connections between universities and research establishments, businesses and the economy of the South West.* This priority outlines a programme of activity to help support the development of the knowledge base and increase its contribution to the regional economy
- *ensure that the competitive position of the South West’s economy is improved and that differences in economic performance in the region are addressed.* Activity to support the roll out of broadband infrastructure across the whole of the region can help to mitigate against economic disadvantage caused by lack of connectivity, and isolation from markets and services

REGIONAL PRIORITY 2A: IMPROVE PARTICIPATION IN THE ECONOMY

Current position

Although the South West continues to enjoy relative economic prosperity, many people in the region remain economically excluded – because of where they live or through lack of skills or confidence. The region lags behind the national average in terms of entry level numeracy skills and only 40% of the workforce has above average entry level ITC skills. There are also a number of groups that experience sustained exclusion – black and minority and disabled people are far more likely to be unemployed or in low paid jobs. Many older people find it hard to re-enter the labour market and women still face inequality of pay and barriers to work because of lack of good quality affordable childcare.

For further detail see the Evidence Base Annex (pp 59-62), and the Strategy document (pp 31-32).

Regional context for delivery

A number of regional strategies, plans and structures incorporate activity to improve participation in the economy. The South West Skills Strategy includes activity to 'Expand the labour market by engaging those who are currently excluded'. The South West Enterprise Strategy sets out activity to encourage 'enterprise for all'. Both provide detail on how headline activities under these priorities will be taken forward. Strategies and plans to support social objectives – such as improving health or rehabilitation of offenders – provide the wider context for delivery under this priority, and coordination between economic and social activity is key.

One of the key strengths of the voluntary and community sector is the role it can play in supporting participation and regeneration. The Regional Compact helps ensure a strong and effective relationship with the VCS and public sector in this and wider work, supported by the work of the South West Forum and the Black South West Network (BSWN).

The development of Equalities South West allows for better engagement and coordination between regional organisations and equalities bodies, providing a real opportunity to improve activity to support disadvantaged groups.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- increased employment and training rates
- reduction in proportion of disadvantaged groups not in education, employment or training

REGIONAL PRIORITY 2A: CROSS CUTTING THEMES

The Strategy highlights a number of important cross cutting themes that should shape the development and delivery of all activity under this priority. This section aims to assist this process by highlighting **examples** of how activity will be steered by:

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- this priority highlights the importance of linking activity for economic inclusion and that to encourage health and well being. One example of how this could contribute to sustainable consumption is through greater local sourcing of fresh produce in hospitals and schools

Climate change and energy

- research on the benefits of incorporating sustainable construction in social housing has demonstrated significant savings in energy costs, benefiting residents who may be economically excluded

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- voluntary and community sector organisations make

a critical contribution to environmental improvement across the region, and in doing so can provide opportunities for individuals to develop new skills and confidence

Sustainable Communities

- the proposed development of a regional strategy for child care could make a significant contribution to supporting sustainable communities by helping to address a significant barrier to employment and other activity

Diversity and Equality

There is clear evidence that some groups in society can experience inequality and discrimination in gaining the skills and experience needed to realise their full potential in the economy. Women are concentrated in lower paid, lower skilled occupations where they earn significantly less than men. People from black and minority ethnic groups are more likely to be unemployed than their white counterparts, and represent only 1% of senior management positions. People with disabilities are more likely to be out of work, whilst younger and older workers often face discrimination on the grounds of age. Evidence also highlights discrimination in employment and training on the basis of sexuality and religion. Activity under this theme supported improving equality of access to work, training and business advice. However, all economic development activity needs to be developed and delivered so that it can contribute to reducing discrimination.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- providing excluded individuals with the skills and

the confidence to use them is a critical catalyst to employment, improving the life of the individual and benefiting the economy as a whole

Innovation

- supporting hard to reach individuals back into the workplace can be challenging, time-consuming and resource intensive. Having flexibility to develop new and innovative approaches to service delivery is therefore essential to ensuring that delivery remains effective

Environment

- volunteering opportunities associated with the environment can help raise skills and aspirations for work and enterprise

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *to ensure that everyone is able to access jobs, services, cultural facilities and activities and quality environments to help them participate in society.* This priority sets out a programme of activity to help support individuals’ access to skills, training and employment
- *to work alongside one another to ensure that coordinated, consistent information is given about tackling discrimination and exclusion in the region.* The development of Equality South West and regional equalities networks will help inform providers of skills, training and business advice in delivering services to groups that face discrimination and barriers to work

REGIONAL PRIORITY 2B: REGENERATE THE MOST DISADVANTAGED AREAS

Current position

Poverty, deprivation and underachievement persist in parts of the South West. Bristol, Plymouth, Torbay, Gloucester and Bournemouth all have concentrations of multiple deprivation with significant numbers of people experiencing a range of problems – poor housing, degraded environments, poor services and low levels of educational achievement and employment. Rural deprivation tends to be more dispersed with particular challenges around low income, poor transport and lack of access to essential services. A number of rural districts have been identified for priority action – six in Cornwall together with Forest of Dean, West Devon, North Devon and Torridge.

For further detail see the Evidence Base Annex (pp 59-62), and the Strategy document (p 32).

Regional context for delivery

There are a number of key strategies and structures that shape the delivery of activity under this theme. The region currently benefits from investment in regeneration through EU and national programmes including Objective 1 and 2, rural development regulations, Neighbourhood Renewal, and the New Deal for Communities. There will be changes to these programmes during the course of the RES and it is important that the region is able to secure appropriate levels of ongoing resource to support regeneration priorities.

There have been important changes to mechanisms at a local level which will shape delivery of this theme. Local Strategic Partnerships and Local Area Agreements will have a significant influence on how activities are implemented at a local level, and will play a key role in ensuring that economic, social and environmental activity is coordinated to achieve local objectives.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- reduced gap in education and employment measures between the most deprived areas and the rest of the region
- reduced gap in productivity between the region's least well performing areas and the rest of the region
- increased levels of enterprise in disadvantaged areas

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- through initiatives such as creating:excellence and Future Foundations, the RES will encourage all physical regeneration activity to meet highest standards of design and sustainability. This improves the quality of regeneration for ‘users’ of these new schemes, and realises cost benefits through, for example, lower energy costs

Climate Change and Energy

- by developing innovative and flexible ways to deliver services in rural areas (including ICT), the region could help reduce carbon emissions through limiting the need to travel

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- integrating environmental improvements within area based initiatives is a critical component of sustainable regeneration. Regional programmes, such as the Greening Infrastructure Initiative, will help increase integration between environmental, economic and social regeneration activity

Sustainable Communities

- sustainability is driving a totally new approach to economic regeneration, where all environmental impacts are minimised and social benefits – including improved health, reduced crime, and better housing – are maximised as an integrated part of the programme. The South West has a real opportunity to ‘get ahead of the game’ in doing so, supported by bodies such as creating:excellence

Diversity and Equality

Evidence shows a close correlation between deprived areas and some economically disadvantaged groups. For example, people from black or minority groups are, on average, much more likely to live in a deprived area. Effective regeneration of the region’s most deprived areas will help to reduce such inequalities.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- the shift to new, more sustainable patterns of regeneration will only be successful if partner organisations have the skills and capacity to change their thinking and behaviour. Appropriate training is therefore essential for this transition, and will be supported by bodies such as creating:excellence and the Learning and Skills Councils

Innovation

- ICT is an important tool to encourage a culture of innovation in all communities in the region. It is therefore critical that ICT connectivity is built into regeneration programmes as a catalyst for innovation and creativity

Environment

- developing high environmental quality in deprived areas can play an important role in encouraging new economic opportunities and investment

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *support those parts of the region that are in need.* This priority identifies specific areas where regeneration activity should be focused
- *to ensure that policy and delivery activity seek to reduce inequality in the region on a variety of different measures integrating social, economic and environmental factors.* Successful delivery of this activity will result in improved physical and social capital in the region’s most deprived areas, including higher rates of employment, increased average incomes, more business activity and better facilities and services

REGIONAL PRIORITY 2C: PLAN SUSTAINABLE AND SUCCESSFUL COMMUNITIES

Current position

Economic regeneration activity has traditionally focused on responding to existing challenges or barriers to economic performance and participation. Whilst it remains critical to tackle the consequences of deprivation in the region, there is an increasing focus – both at national and regional level – on looking forward; on planning more effectively to develop successful and sustainable communities that are productive, healthy, socially just, and that respect environmental limits.

Clearly, regeneration and planning for a sustainable future are often two sides of the same coin. However, the principles of planning for sustainable and successful communities should apply to every community in the region. The activities identified in this priority include both generic and targeted work to help to achieve this.

Regional context for delivery

The South West Sustainable Communities Plan, 'The Way Ahead', sets out a framework for how the region will actively manage the future development of the South West in a way that:

- responds to the challenges and opportunities arising from population growth and increased global competition
- ensures access to well paid jobs that fully utilise the region's skills and experience
- provides good quality affordable housing

- enables the region to continue to benefit from its outstanding environment

Regional activity, including the work being undertaken by The Way Ahead steering group, has begun to focus on how the region can develop dynamic, international cities capable of attracting global businesses, the best creative talent, and high levels of investment. Likewise, measures are being developed and implemented to support the future success and sustainability of rural communities through strengthening the performance of local economies and improving access to wider services and markets.

The Way Ahead supports and is supported by other regional strategies and policies including the IRS, RES, RSS and the SW Sustainable Development Framework.

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- increased use of tools such as REEIO, SCPs and Ecological footprinting techniques to steer the development and delivery of economic development will help to improve the sustainability of interventions

Climate Change and Energy

- in developing the sustainable communities of the future, the region needs to ensure that the need to travel by car is minimised. This can be achieved through ensuring an appropriate mix of housing and employment land is made available to reduce the need to commute; by improving infrastructure to encourage walking, cycling and the use of public transport, and by integrating the highest possible levels of ICT connectivity within new development

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- the development of an integrated land use strategy for the region would bring together a range of economic, social and environmental objectives to help improve the management, protection and enhancement of the natural environment

Sustainable Communities

- ensuring appropriate levels of quality housing is a critical issue here. Housing affordability is already a major challenge across the region; projected population increases will increase the challenge still further. The region needs to agree a sensible approach to managing this growth, which maintains the vibrancy and economic viability of the region’s communities, whilst minimising the impact on the environment

Diversity and Equalities

Research by academics such as Richard Florida has highlighted the importance of diversity in ‘creating the conditions’ for vibrant successful cities. If the region is going to make progress in developing its largest urban areas into ‘dynamic, international cities’, it needs to promote measures that enhance and celebrate diversity through activity under this theme.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- skills infrastructure – in the form of high quality schools, colleges and universities – is a key driver in promoting the renaissance of the region’s largest urban areas as dynamic, international cities

Innovation

- planning for a sustainable future requires different approaches than in the past. The proposed development of a Regional Infrastructure Fund to bring forward development in the region’s key growth areas is one example of where the region is adopting an innovative approach in this priority

Environment

- as an increasing proportion of the region’s population will live in cities and urban areas in future, the quality of the built urban environment will be more important than ever. The rollout of programmes such as the ‘Spacemakers’ initiative will help support this objective

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *to provide sufficient housing to meet identified future needs, including affordable housing.* This priority endorses this objective as critical to the region’s future sustainable economic success
- *to ensure that the long-term effects of population growth and change are anticipated in the planning of the full range of public services.* Looking forward to plan better for the future is at the heart of this priority. A wide range of activity is highlighted to support this – whilst recognising the challenging issues that still need to be addressed

REGIONAL PRIORITY 3A: IMPROVE TRANSPORT NETWORKS

Current position

The evidence base for the RES demonstrated that the effectiveness of transport is an important determinant of the region's competitiveness. For example, time and distance from markets is shown to have a direct impact on business productivity, as is increasing congestion in the region's major cities and towns. Research and the RES consultation has indicated that targeting improvements that increase the reliability of inter-regional and international connections should be the priority. Likewise, regional priorities for reducing congestion need to initially focus on 'unlocking' areas where higher levels of growth are anticipated.

For further detail see the Evidence Base Annex (pp 52-56), and the Strategy document (p 35).

Regional context for delivery

Given the scale and expense of transport infrastructure improvements, regional activity is strongly influenced by national transport policy. For example, White Papers on air transport (2004) and rail (2005) set out the framework for regional activity to improve infrastructure in these modes of transport.

The Regional Transport Strategy (RTS), coordinated by the Regional Assembly and revised through the RSS process, identifies the main priorities for infrastructure development. For the larger projects, the RTS provides the basis for discussions with government and appropriate agencies to take forward proposals. For less costly priorities, new proposals for Regional Funding Allocations may help the region influence how and when schemes are taken forward.

ICT connectivity is also a priority within the regional economic strategy and is included under 1E.

Headline success measures

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- reduced journey times to major markets
- increased reliability of transport infrastructure
- increased use of public transport, walking and cycling in the region's largest cities and towns

REGIONAL PRIORITY 3A: CROSS CUTTING THEMES

The Strategy highlights a number of important cross cutting themes that should shape the development and delivery of all activity under this priority. This section aims to assist this process by highlighting **examples** of how activity will be steered by:

- sustainable development objectives (taken from ‘Securing the Future’, the UK National Strategy)
- diversity and equalities

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- this priority highlights the need to implement tools to manage the demand for travel, particularly in the context of reducing congestion in the region’s main cities and towns

Climate Change and Energy

- implementation of this priority includes both opportunities and challenges with respect to climate change and energy. Activity to improve rail links and manage congestion should make a positive impact, whilst the development of airports will lead to increased carbon emissions as air travel increases. The latter presents a significant tension for the region which, on the one hand is seeking to reduce its environmental footprint whilst on the other needs to improve its connectivity to national and international markets to help sustain economic

performance. This tension will be considered in the SW debates proposed in 3C.1

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- new transport infrastructure can clearly present challenges to this objective. However where such infrastructure is developed, its impact should be minimised by appropriate mitigation techniques

Sustainable Communities

- this priority contributes to sustainable communities by seeking to improve the reliability and resilience of the region’s main inter-regional key public transport networks, and by reducing congestion which can have a significant impact on quality of life measures such as health

Diversity and Equality

People can experience transport inequality due to lack of access and cost. Although the Disability Discrimination Act requires transport providers to take ‘responsible steps’ to provide access to their services, many people with a disability still face difficulties in trying to travel by public transport. Another example is the disadvantages that young people can face due to the costs, and lack of access to, public transport services. Activity to improve transport infrastructure and accessibility should incorporate appropriate steps to address these inequalities.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- skills issues have been incorporated in the development of the Regional Funding Allocations (RFA). This process identified the need to increase

public sector skills for developing transport proposals, so that they stand a more realistic chance of securing funding and being delivered. Proposals for a capacity fund to support this have therefore been included within the RFA proposals

Innovation

- the development of a Regional Infrastructure fund as part of the RFA process is an innovative approach that is designed to bring forward transport infrastructure improvements in growth areas

Environment

- the push to reduce carbon emissions from transport presents new market opportunities for South West business. The development of the new composite materials facility in Bristol is supporting aerospace companies to develop more fuel efficient aircraft

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *to use growth as an opportunity to provide adequate transport infrastructure and make the best of existing and proposed investment.* This priority includes activity to lobby for resources to deliver improved connectivity and reduced congestion
- *to improve intra- and inter-regional communications and embrace new technological developments to enhance access to labour and product markets, whilst shifting towards a more sustainable transport policy which protects the environment and manages ‘greenhouse’ gas emissions.* This priority includes activity to manage the demand for travel

REGIONAL PRIORITY 3B: PROMOTE AND ENHANCE WHAT IS BEST ABOUT THE REGION

Current position

The evidence base and review process has highlighted a number of key regional strengths which, when taken together, provide a strong basis for promoting the South West. Our environmental 'capital' is a key asset with the region enjoying, for example, the highest proportions of designated land, heritage coastline, and listed monuments of any of the English regions.

The quality of the region's cultural 'offer' is also critical in defining the 'sense of place' which attracts visitors and investment to the region – be it through iconic attractions such as Bath, Eden or Stonehenge, through internationally renowned festivals at Cheltenham and Glastonbury, or through the high levels of participation in cultural activities.

The South West has a number of specific strengths in promoting and delivering sustainable development, and is well placed to take advantage of this as national and international pressures for more sustainable patterns of development increase.

For further detail see the Evidence Base Annex (pp 68-71), and the Strategy document (pp 35-36).

Regional context for delivery

There are a number of strategies and structures that guide the delivery of some of the work within this priority. 'In Search of Chunky Dunsters', the Regional Cultural Strategy, provides the overall framework for cultural development in the region – a key component of the South West's 'sense of place'. 'Our Environment, Our Future', the South West Environment Strategy, articulates priorities for the protection and enhancement of the natural

environment, with additional relevant detail in regional strategies for renewable energy and waste.

'Towards 2015', the region's sustainable tourism strategy, sets out priorities for the development of the sector that play a key role in developing visitor perceptions of the region. The Regional Sustainable Development Framework provides the context for developing and delivering economic development activity more sustainably.

In addition to these formal strategies and partnerships, delivery of this priority will shape the South West England marketing campaign, and will need to reflect the development of structures in preparation for the London 2012 Olympics.

Successful delivery of this priority will result in:

- improved perception of the region by businesses and visitors, leading to increased levels of investment and visitor spend
- improvements to sustainability/quality of life indicators

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- like many parts of the UK, the region faces significant challenges in how to manage increasing levels of waste. This priority highlights activity to improve sustainability of production by reducing business waste, and by stimulating markets for recyclates

Climate Change and Energy

- the priority sets out a number of activities that will support this objective, including the development of the Regional Sustainable Energy Strategy, and the implementation of the Strategy for Sustainable Tourism, which is encouraging visitors to use alternative means of travel

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- the identification of the environment as a key driver has brought economic and environmental organisations together to develop common objectives and actions to protect and enhance the region’s environment. This is best encapsulated through the RES statement of intent – ‘to demonstrate that economic growth can be secured within environmental limits to bring prosperity to the region’

Sustainable Communities

- culture and creativity are critical to ensuring that communities across the region remain vibrant and sustainable. The delivery of the regional cultural infrastructure strategy, and the development of regional icons, will help to ensure that our cultural ‘capital’ is maintained and enhanced

Diversity and Equality

The region’s diversity – in all senses of the word – is one of its most significant strengths. Work to promote the region to new businesses or visitors can use this diversity positively to change perceptions of the region and encourage investment.

Economic Drivers

Skills

- skills and training drive a range of activity under this priority. From skills for sustainable construction, through training to exploit new markets in renewable energy and waste, to the development of ‘green’ tourism skills, they play a critical role in the successful delivery of this priority

Innovation

- innovation has driven much of the current approach to this priority. The South West was the first region

to identify and use the Environment Driver concept. It is also one of the first to make such a clear statement of intent regarding prosperity within environmental limits – which could potentially lead to significant changes to how economic development activity is delivered in future

Environment

- one of the clearest ways in which the driver is used for economic benefit is through the regional marketing and branding activity. The strapline ‘It’s in our nature’, supported by images of the high quality built and natural environment underline the importance of the region’s environmental quality to attracting investment and visitors

- *to fully understand and recognise the significance, and make much better use of the social and economic benefits, of the region’s high quality environment and the cultural distinctiveness of the South West.* Whilst this priority highlights activity to make better economic use of our cultural and environmental capital, there are still gaps in our understanding of the extent of the link between the environment and its direct economic benefit
- *to ensure our natural resources are used much more sustainably by using land wisely, minimising waste and increasing recycling, using renewables, and promoting sustainable construction and good design.* This priority sets out a range of activities to support this objective

REGIONAL PRIORITY 3C: IMPROVE LEADERSHIP, INFLUENCE AND PARTNERSHIP

Current position

Successful economic regions are characterised by dynamic leadership, effective representation and strong committed partnerships. By investing in the development of shared visions, purposes and priorities, successful regions increase the impact of their interventions and attract more public and private investment for infrastructure and development projects. They also influence public policy to ensure that it supports their vision without creating unnecessary barriers to business development and growth.

Regional context for delivery

The South West Integrated Regional Strategy, 'Just Connect', brings together a shared vision and set of objectives covering all aspects of the region's sustainable development – economic, social and environmental. It represents a commitment by all of the major regional partners to a common vision and to integrated partnership approaches to delivering that vision. The RES, the RSS and other regional strategies are key elements in the delivery of the prosperous and fair society that we all aspire to.

An effective partnership approach remains key to success in the region particularly in the light of the opportunities and challenges we face over the next ten years. The development of Local Strategic Partnerships, and the potential re-organisation of governance structures will need to be considered in taking forward activities in this priority.

REGIONAL PRIORITY 3C: CROSS CUTTING THEMES

The Strategy highlights a number of important cross cutting themes that should shape the development and delivery of all activity under this priority. This section aims to assist this process by highlighting **examples** of how activity will be steered by:

- sustainable development objectives (taken from ‘Securing the Future’, the UK National Strategy)
- diversity and equalities
- the three economic drivers identified in the RES – Skills, Innovation and the Environment
- objectives set out in ‘Just Connect’, the Integrated Regional Strategy

Sustainable Development

Sustainable Consumption and Production

- work to improve our understanding of the region will strengthen the evidence base for activity to support sustainable consumption and production. For example, the Regional Observatory will deliver enhanced data for local sustainability appraisals, and the regional economic accounts will be developed to incorporate environmental measures

Climate Change and Energy

- two of the SW Debates proposed under this priority will focus on securing economic growth within environmental limits, and energy challenges. These will help the region to develop a clearer understanding of, and response to, climate change and energy

Protecting Natural Resources, and Enhancing our Environment

- the identification of the environment as a key driver has brought economic and environmental organisations together to develop common objectives and actions to protect and enhance the region’s environment. This integration between traditionally separate activity demonstrates how the region is improving policy and partnership to support this SD objective

Sustainable Communities

- increasing participation in decision making is an important component of sustainable communities. This priority highlights activity to improve capacity of both local and sub-regional partners, and the voluntary and community sector to help ensure they are able to engage in the development and delivery of economic development policy

Diversity and Equality

The establishment of Equality South West provides a mechanism to ensure that the needs and views of groups that have traditionally been disadvantaged in the economy are effectively incorporated into the development and delivery of regional economic policy.

Economic drivers

Skills

- this priority highlights the need for enhanced leadership skills in the public sector as a catalyst to improvements in policy and activity within the region

Innovation

- there are a number of examples – such as Equality South West, and the South West Observatory – where innovative or novel approaches have been adopted to improve leadership, influence and partnership in the region

Environment

- the ‘Greening Regional Development Programme’ Inter-reg project has been developed in the South West to enable regions from across Europe to exchange good practice on incorporating the environment into economic development policy and delivery

‘Just Connect’

Activity under this theme supports the following ‘crunch’ objectives from the IRS:

- *to ensure an active, inclusive and creative approach to consultation on policy and delivery in the region.* This priority identifies the need for activity to increase capacity in the voluntary and community sector, and in sub-regional and local partnerships to help ensure that the delivery of the RES meets this objective

GLOSSARY

Additionality:

The total net, hopefully positive, impact of intervention.

Capital:

Physical economic resources, e.g. plant and machinery, factories and offices, available for use as a factor of production with labour to generate output. If “capital” means financial capital it is stated as such.

Consumption:

Expenditure on goods and services which delivers satisfaction in a specific time period.

Comparative Advantage:

A country or sector’s ability to produce a good or service at a lower opportunity cost than its trading partners.

Displacement:

Interventions may divert, for good or ill, activity from existing operations.

Disposable Income:

The amount of income left after deductions such as income tax, pension contributions and national insurance.

Employment Location Quotient:

A measure of relative employment concentration geographic areas.

Entrepreneurs:

People who undertake the risks of innovative production of goods and services in the expectation of future returns.

Equilibrium:

A state of market balance – where there is no tendency or incentive to change demand and supply.

Externalities:

The spillover effects of production or consumption for which no market payment is made. Externalities can be positive or negative.

Globalisation:

The growing inter-dependence amongst world economies and enterprises, reflecting new technologies and the removal of barriers to international commerce.

Gross Fixed Capital Formation:

Total spending on fixed investment e.g. machines, factories, offices.

Gross Domestic Product (GDP):

The total value of all goods and services produced in a given time and in a given geographic or politically-defined area, excluding net property income from abroad.

Gross Value Added (GVA):

The aggregated difference between the value of final goods (turnover) minus the cost of bought-in raw materials and intermediate goods.

$GDP = GVA (- \text{taxes} + \text{subsidies on products})$

Human Capital:

The accumulated stock of skills, knowledge and expertise of workers/labour.

Intervention:

The act of intervening in a market to try to influence market outcomes.

Investment:

The accumulation of capital resources that enable economic actors to produce goods and services and yield returns in more than one period.

Labour Market:

The market in which demand and supply for labour is effected – firms willing to employ workers and labour seeking employment.

Leakage:

Benefits/costs of intervention that leak into non-target areas.

Market Failure:

Occurs when the workings of the price mechanism are imperfect and result in an inefficient or unfair allocation of resources from the perspective of society.

Macroeconomics:

The study of groups of economic actors in a whole economy, international, national or regional.

Microeconomics:

The study of the behaviour of an individual, firm or industry.

Opportunity Cost:

The decision to produce or consume a product or service involves a resource commitment that means other products and services cannot be produced or consumed. The real cost of an economic action is the benefit from the next best alternative foregone.

Price Mechanism:

Prices act as a signal of absolute and relative values to firms and consumers to adjust their economic behaviour. For example, a rise in price encourages producers to switch into making that good but encourages consumers to use an alternative substitute product.

Productivity:

Total output divided by total inputs (factors of production).

Real Terms:

The adjustment of monetary values for the effects of inflation.

Resource Efficiency:

Efficient use of land, labour, capital and entrepreneurs.

Substitution:

Positive/negative changes in behaviour induced by intervention.

Sustainable Development (SD):

Development where consideration is given to the quality of life of future as well as current generations.

Transfer Payments:

Payments for which no good or service is exchanged. Money has simply been transferred from one person in society to another.

Wealth:

A stock of all those assets capable of earning an income. Wealth can be human or material.
